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# SUPERCONVERGENCE OF MIXED FINITE ELEMENT METHODS FOR PARABOLIC EQUATIONS (*) 

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#### Abstract

An asymptotic expansion of the mixed finite element solution of a linear parabolic problem is used to derive superconvergence results. Optimal order error estimates in Sobolev spaces of negative index are also shown.


Résumé. - Un développement asymptotique de la solution par élément fini mixte d'un problème parabolique linéaire est utilisé pour obtenir des résultats de superconvergence. On obtient aussi des estimations d'erreur d'ordre optimal dans les espaces de Sobolev d'exposant négatif.

## 1. INTRODUCTION

Let $\Omega$ be a bounded domain in $\mathbb{R}^{2}$ with smooth boundary $\partial \Omega$. Consider the linear parabolic problem

(c)
$p=p_{0}, \quad x \in \Omega, T=0$,
where $J=(0, T)$, and $a, b, c$ are smooth functions of $x$ alone such that $a$ and $d$ are bounded below by a positive constant. Assume that the elliptic part of the operator is invertible.

Denote by (,) the natural inner product in $L^{2}(\Omega)$ or $L^{2}(\Omega)^{2}$, and by $\langle$,$\rangle the one in L^{2}(\partial \Omega)$. Let

with the norm

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and $W=L^{2}(\Omega)$. Form the parabolic mixed method as follows. Set

Then, if $\alpha=a^{-1}$ and $\beta=a^{-1} b$, integration by parts in the relation

where $v$ denotes the unit outward normal vector to $\partial \Omega$. The partial differential equation is represented by the weak form

In order to define the mixed finite element method for (1.1) let $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ denote the Raviart-Thomas-Nedelec space [11, 12, 14] of index $k \geqslant 0$ associated with a quasi-regular partition $J_{h}$ of $\Omega$ that is such that
i) if $T \in \mathfrak{J}_{h}, T$ is either a triangle or a rectangle,
ii) if $T \subset \Omega, T$ has straight edges,
iii) if $T$ is a boundary triangle or rectangle, the boundary edge can be curved,
iv) all vertex angles are bounded below by a positive constant,
v) $\operatorname{diam}(T)=h_{T}, \max h_{T}=h$,

## $T$

vi) rectangles : ratio of edges bounded.

The definition of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ is as follows. Let $P_{k}(T)$ denote the restriction of the polynomials of total degree $k$ to the set $T$ and let $P_{k, l}(T)$ denote the restriction of $P_{k}(R) \otimes P_{l}(R)$ to $T$. If $T$ is a triangle, let

where $x=\left(x_{1}, x_{2}\right)$. Similarly, if $T$ is a rectangle, let

Note that $\operatorname{div} V_{h}=W_{h}$, and

where $\nu_{l}$ is the outer normal to $T_{l}$. The above definition of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ coincides with that of Raviart and Thomas [12] for rectangular elements and is the modification due to Nedelec [11] on triangular elements. Next, consider the projection

defined by Raviart and Thomas for polygonal domains [12] and which satisfies
(a) $P_{h}$ is the $L^{2}(\Omega)$-projection;
(b) the following diagram commutes :

i.e., $\operatorname{div} \pi_{h}=P_{h} \operatorname{div}: V \xrightarrow{\text { onto }} W_{h}$
(c) the following approximation properties hold :

Arnold-Douglas-Roberts [8] have introduced a modification on the definition of $\pi_{h}$ in order to include boundary triangles with curved edges.

The semidiscrete mixed finite element method for (1.1) consists of finding $\left\{u_{h}, p_{h}\right\}: J \rightarrow V_{h} \times W_{h}$ such that, for $t \in J$,
(a) $\left(\alpha u_{h}, v\right)-\left(\operatorname{div} v, p_{h}\right)+\left(\beta p_{h}, v\right)=-\langle g, v . v\rangle, \quad v \in V_{h}$,
(b) $\left(d \frac{\partial p_{h}}{\partial t}, w\right)+\left(\operatorname{div} u_{h}, w\right)+\left(c p_{h}, w\right)=(f, w), \quad w \in W_{h}$.

It is also necessary to specify the initial value for $p_{h}$ (as those for $u_{h}$ then follow from (1.5a)). This specification will be done later.

The main objective of this work is the establishment of superconvergence of the solution of a semidiscrete mixed finite element method to the solution of the linear parabolic problem in $\mathbb{R}^{2}$. In a single space variable, knot superconvergence has been demonstrated for semidiscrete Galerkin approximation of solutions of linear parabolic problems by Douglas-DupontWheeler [5]. The basic tool they have used consists of an asymptotic expansion of the Galerkin solution by means of a sequence of elliptic projections they have called a quasi-projection. Arnold and Douglas [1] have carried out the results for quasilinear parabolic equations. Using a different approach Thomée [15] has also analysed superconvergence phenomena in Galerkin methods for parabolic problems in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. In this work, a quasi-projection for mixed methods for linear parabolic problems is introduced and then used to produce asymptotic expansions to high order of the mixed method solution. Superconvergence is then derived by postprocessing.

Note that by using this post-processing procedure the number of parameters involved in the calculation of $u_{h}$ and $p_{h}$ is much smaller than it would be in order to obtain the same accuracy by either increasing the index of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ or by reducing $h$. Thus, the cost of obtaining a given accuracy is much reduced by the employment of the post-processing, which is quite inexpensive in comparison to the evaluation of $u_{h}$ and $p_{h}$.

A brief outline of this paper is as follows. In sections 2,3 and 4 the quasiprojection for parabolic mixed methods for problems in $\mathbb{R}^{2}$ with Dirichlet boundary conditions is defined and optimal order estimates in Sobolev spaces of negative index are derived for the approximations to the solution and its associated flow field. In sections 5 and 6, following Bramble and Schatz [2,3], an averaging operator is introduced and estimates on difference quotients of the error are derived. These estimates then imply the superconvergence error estimates for the post-processed approximations.

## 2. FORMULATION OF THE MIXED METHOD QUASI-PROJECTION

Let

Let $s$ be a nonnegative integer and let $H^{s}(\Omega)$ be the usual Sobolev space ; i.e., the set of all functions in $L^{2}(\Omega)$ whose distributional derivatives of order not greater than $s$ are also in $L^{2}(\Omega) ; H^{s}(\Omega)$ is normed by

The object of a quasi-projection is to produce an expansion of $\zeta$ and $\sigma$ that begins with the pair $\eta, \xi$ and then has terms decreasing in magnitude by a factor of $h^{2}$ until the limit of the negative norm estimates for the corresponding elliptic mixed method is reached. Its construction is as follows. First, let

(a) $\left(\alpha \xi_{j}, v\right)-\left(\operatorname{div} v, \eta_{j}\right)+\left(\beta \eta_{j}, v\right)=0, \quad v \in V_{h}$,
(b) $\left(\operatorname{div} \xi_{j}, w\right)+\left(c \eta_{j}, w\right)=-\left(d \frac{\partial \eta_{j-1}}{\partial t}, w\right), \quad w \in W_{h}$,
for $j=2,3, \ldots$.
Let

The expansions $p_{j}$ and $u_{j}$ are called quasi-projections and the terms $\theta_{j}$ and $\psi_{j}$ are the residuals.

The objective now is to carry out negative norm estimates for $\eta, \xi$, $\eta_{j}$, and $\xi_{j}$. It will be necessary to consider their time-derivatives as well, but the independence of the coefficients of the time variable will make this easy.

The arguments will involve duality and will follow the development by Douglas and Roberts [8] in obtaining global error estimates for the correspondent linear elliptic problem. Their argument has been based on the duality lemma to follow.

Lemma 2.1: Let $s$ be a nonnegative integer and let the index $k$ of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ be at least one. Assume that $\Omega$ is $(s+2)$-regular. Let $\tau \in V$, $F \in V^{\prime}$ and $G \in W^{\prime}$. If $F$ has the form

The main theorem in Douglas and Roberts [8] of interest here is the following :

THEOREM 2.2 : Let s be a nonnegative integer and let $\eta$ and $\xi$ be given by (2.2). Then,
(a) $\|\eta\|_{-s} \leqslant Q h^{r+\min (s, k+1)}\|p\|_{r+(s-k+1)^{+}}$,

(b) $\|\xi\|_{-s} \leqslant Q h^{r+\min (s, k+1)}\|p\|_{r+1+(s-k)^{+}}$,

## 3. A PRIORI ESTIMATES FOR THE QUASI-PROJECTION

Assume that $s$ is a nonnegative integer throughout this section, that the index $k$ is odd and satisfies $k \geqslant 1$, and that $\Omega$ is ( $s+2$ )-regular. Lemma 2.1 implies that,

If the choice $s=0$ is made in (3.1) and (3.2), then

for $j=2,3, \ldots$, and

& \left.+h^{\min (s+2, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial \eta}{\partial t}\right\|+\left\|\frac{\partial \eta}{\partial t}\right\|_{-s-2}\right\} .
\end{align*}
$$

First consider the estimation of $\eta_{1}$. Theorem 2.2 implies that

\text {for } 2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1
\end{array}

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and $l$ a positive integer. Next, consider the estimation of $\frac{\partial^{l} \eta_{j}}{\partial t^{l}}$.
Assume from now on that $j$ is a positive integer such that $2 j \leqslant k+1$.
Lemma 3.1 :

& +h^{r+2 j-2+\min (s+2, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial^{l+j} p}{\partial t^{l+j}}\right\| \|_{r+(2 j-1-k)^{+}} \\
& \left.+h^{r+\min (s+2 j, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial^{l+j} p}{\partial t^{l+j}}\right\|_{r+(s+2 j+1-k)^{+}}\right\} \\
\leqslant & Q h^{r+\min (s+2 j, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial^{l+j} p}{\partial t^{l+j}}\right\|_{r+(s+2 j+1-k)^{+}}

= & -\left(c \eta_{j}+d \frac{\partial \eta_{j-1}}{\partial t}, \varphi\right) \\
& +\left(c \eta_{j}+d \frac{\partial \eta_{j-1}}{\partial t}+\operatorname{div} \xi_{j}, \varphi-P_{h} \varphi\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus,
(3.21) $\left|\left(\alpha \xi_{j},-a \nabla \varphi\right)\right| \leqslant Q\|\varphi\|_{s+1}\left\{h^{\min (s+1, k+1)}\left[\left\|\eta_{j}\right\|+\left\|\frac{\partial \eta_{j-1}}{\partial t}\right\|\right]+\right.$

$$
\left.+\left\|\eta_{j}\right\|_{-s-1}+\left\|\frac{\partial \eta_{j-1}}{\partial t}\right\|_{-s-1}\right\}
$$

Next, since $\operatorname{div} \delta=0$ and (div $\left.\left(\delta-\pi_{h} \delta\right), \eta_{j}\right)=0$,

for $s \geqslant 1$ and $j=2,3, \ldots$. Similarly,

Next, (3.10), (3.13), and Lemma 3.1 imply the following lemma :
LEMMA 3.2: For $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$

4. BOUNDS FOR THE RESIDUALS

## Recall that

(a) $\left(\alpha \psi_{j}, v\right)-\left(\operatorname{div} v, \theta_{j}\right)+\left(\beta \theta_{j}, v\right)=0, \quad v \in V_{h}$,
(b) $\left(d \frac{\partial \theta_{j}}{\partial t}, w\right)+\left(\operatorname{div} \psi_{j}, w\right)+\left(c \theta_{j}, w\right)=\left(d \frac{\partial \eta_{j}}{\partial t}, w\right), w \in W_{h}$.

Take $v=\psi_{j}$ and $w=\theta_{j}$ in (4.1) and add :

and

\|\varphi\|_{L^{\infty}(X)}=\|\varphi\|_{L^{\infty}(J ; X)}=\underset{0 \leqslant t \leqslant T}{\operatorname{ess} \sup }\|\varphi(t)\|_{X}

for an arbitrary normed space $X$. Next, differentiate (4.1a) with respect to the time variable and set $v=\psi_{j}$. Now, set $w=\frac{\partial \theta_{j}}{\partial t}$ in $(4.1 b)$, add the two resulting equations and integrate in time. It follows that

\end{align*}

Let

Then, Lemma 3.1 implies that

& \quad \leqslant Q\left\{h^{r+k+1}\left\|\frac{\partial^{J+1} p}{\partial t^{J+1}}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{r+2}\right)}+\left\|\theta_{J}(0)\right\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}+\left\|\psi_{J}(0)\right\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}\right\}
\end{align*}

for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$. Thus, it is desirable that $\theta_{J}(0)$ and $\psi_{J}(0)$ be chosen so that they are $0\left(h^{r+k+1}\right)$. Consider the initialization of $u_{h}$ and $p_{h}$.
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Recall that

These values can be computed using no more than the data $f$ and $p_{0}$ and the differential operator. To see that, first note that $\partial^{l} p(0) / \partial t^{l}$ can be computed from $p_{0}$ and the partial differential equation ; thus $\partial^{l} \tilde{p}_{h}(0) / \partial t^{l}$ and $\partial^{l} \tilde{u}_{h}(0) / \partial t^{l}$ can be evaluated from (2.3). Finally, (2.5) and (2.7) can be used to complete the computation of $u_{h}(0)$ and $p_{h}(0)$. Hence, the following has been proved.

LEMMA 4.1: If the mixed finite element method is initialized by (4.7) and $J$ is defined by (4.4), then

The optimal order negative norm estimates for the error in the mixed method solution can now be obtained by applying the results of this section and Theorem 2.2.

& \left\|u-u_{h}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)} \leqslant\|\xi\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)}+\sum_{i=1}^{J}\left\|\xi_{i}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{-k-2+2 \imath}\right)}+\left\|\psi_{J}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)}
\end{aligned}
$$

The theorem now follows from Lemmas 3.1, 3.2, and 4.1.
If $k$ is even and $J$ is now such that $2 J=k+2$, then Theorem 4.2 remains valid [13].

Optimal order estimates for $\operatorname{div}\left(u-u_{h}\right)$ have also been derived in [13].

## 5. CONVERGENCE OF DIFFERENCE QUOTIENTS

Throughout this section and the next let $\Omega$ be a rectangle in $\mathbb{R}^{2}$ and assume that all coefficients of the partial differential equation in (1.1) as well as $f$ and $p_{0}$ can be extended periodically to all of $\mathbb{R}^{2}$ while satisfying the same smoothness conditions as in section 1 . Let $\mathfrak{J}_{h}$ be a uniform grid, and consider the mixed method for the periodic problem associated with (1.1); i.e., for any $t \in J$, find $\left\{u_{h}, p_{h}\right\} \in V_{h} \times W_{h}$ satisfying

\text { (c) }\left\{u_{h}, p_{h}\right\} \text { periodic of period } \Omega &
\end{array}
$$

The projection $\left\{\tilde{u}_{h}, \tilde{p}_{h}\right\}$ and the terms $\left\{\xi_{i}, \eta_{i}\right\}$ of the quasi-projection are now to be taken as periodic of period $\Omega$ as are the residuals $\left\{\theta_{j}, \psi_{j}\right\}$.

Next, consider the introduction of forward difference quotients. Let $\mu=\left(\mu_{1}, \mu_{2}\right)$ have integer components and define the translation operator $T_{h}^{\mu}$ by

will be carried out. These estimates will then be used in the next section to prove superconvergence. Let $v$ be a multi-index and assume from now on that $|v|=\nu_{1}+\nu_{2} \leqslant k+1$. First, the estimates for $\{\xi, \eta\}$ follow from Douglas-Milner [6] for $s \geqslant 0$ :

So, assume $|\nu| \geqslant 1, j \geqslant 2$, and that (5.23) holds for $|\mu| \leqslant|\nu|-1$ and for $j-1$. A simple calculation now completes the proof.

Lemma 5.4: If $s \geqslant 1$, then
(a) $\left\|\partial^{v}\left(\frac{\partial^{l} \eta_{j}}{\partial t^{l}}\right)\right\|_{-s} \leqslant Q h^{r+\min (s+2 j, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial^{l+j} p}{\partial t^{l+j}}\right\|_{r+(s+2 j+1-k)^{+}+|v|}$,
(b) $\left\|\partial^{\nu}\left(\frac{\partial^{l} \xi_{j}}{\partial t^{l}}\right)\right\|_{-s} \leqslant Q h^{r+\min (s+2 j-1, k+1)}\left\|\frac{\partial^{l+j} p}{\partial t^{l+j}}\right\|_{r+(s+2 j-k)^{+}+|v|^{\prime}}$,
for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$.
Proof: Use an induction argument on $|\nu|$ and $j$.
Since the spaces $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ are translation invariant, it follows from (2.9) and (5.2) that

\end{align*}

$v \in V_{h}$. Also,

& \left(d \partial^{\nu}\left(\frac{\partial \theta_{j}}{\partial t}\right), w\right)+\left(\operatorname{div} \partial^{\nu} \psi_{j}, w\right)+\left(c \partial^{\nu} \theta_{j}, w\right)=  \tag{5.26}\\
& = \\
& \quad-\sum_{\mu<v}\binom{v}{\mu}\left(T_{h}^{\mu} \partial_{h}^{\nu-\mu} d \partial_{h}^{\mu}\left(\frac{\partial \theta_{j}}{\partial t}\right)+T_{h}^{\mu} \partial_{h}^{\nu-\mu} c \partial_{h}^{\mu} \theta_{j}, w\right) \\
& \quad+\sum_{\mu \leqslant v}\binom{v}{\mu}\left(T_{h}^{\mu} \partial_{h}^{\nu-\mu} d \partial_{h}^{\mu}\left(\frac{\partial \eta_{j}}{\partial t}\right), w\right), \quad w \in W_{h} .
\end{align*}
$$

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Take $v=\partial^{\nu} \psi_{j}$ in (5.25), $w=\partial^{\nu} \theta_{j}$ in (5.26), add, and integrate with respect to time to obtain the inequality

& \quad Q\left\{\sum_{\mu<\nu}\left(\left\|\partial^{\mu} \theta_{j}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\mu} \psi_{j}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\mu}\left(\frac{\partial \theta_{j}}{\partial t}\right)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}\right)\right. \\
& \\
& \\
& \left.\quad+\sum_{\mu \leqslant \nu}\left\|\partial^{\mu}\left(\frac{\partial \eta_{j}}{\partial t}\right)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \theta_{j}(0)\right\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}\right\} .
\end{align*}
$$

At this stage an extra assumption will be made in order to avoid one of the terms arising on the righ-hand side of (5.27).

Assume $d(x)=d$ to constant.
Note that this assumption does not imply a loss of generality. In fact, if $d$ depends on $x$, then the change of variables $P=d p$ leads to the differential equation

$$
\frac{\partial p}{\partial t}-\nabla \cdot\left(\frac{a}{d} \nabla P+\left(\frac{b}{d}-\frac{a \nabla d}{d}\right) P\right)+\frac{c}{d} P=f
$$

in which the $d$ coefficient is constant. The mixed method will then furnish approximation to $P$ and to the original flow field $u$ associated with $p$, since the flow field $U$ associated with $P$ is in fact identical to $u$ :

U=-\frac{a}{d} \nabla P-\left(\frac{b}{d}-\frac{a \nabla d}{d}\right) P=-a \nabla p-b p=u .
$$

Now, with $d$ constant, inequality (5.27) reduces to

&\left.+\left\|\partial^{\nu}\left(\frac{\partial \eta_{j}}{\partial t}\right)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \theta_{j}(0)\right\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}\right\}
\end{align*}

Next, estimate (5.24a) implies that

\left\|\partial^{\nu}\left(\frac{\partial \eta_{J}}{\partial t}\right)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)} \leqslant Q h^{r+k+1}\left\|\frac{\partial^{J+1} p}{\partial t^{J+1}}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{r+2+\mid \nu 1}\right)} \tag{5.29}
\end{equation*}
$$

for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$, where

\begin{equation*}
2 J=k+1 \tag{5.30}
\end{equation*}
$$

Hence, the initialization given by (4.7) implies that

&\left\|\partial^{\nu} \theta_{J}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \psi_{J}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)} \leqslant Q\left\{\sum_{\mu<\nu}\left(\left\|\partial^{\mu} \theta_{J}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\mu} \psi_{J}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}\right)+\right.  \tag{5.31}\\
&\left.+h^{r+k+1}\left\|\frac{\partial^{J+1} p}{\partial t^{J+1}}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{r+2+\mid \nu 1}\right)}\right\},
\end{align*}
$$

for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$.
An easy induction argument leads to the following lemma.
Lemma 5.5 :

for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant k+1$.

## 6. THE SUPERCONVERGENCE ESTIMATES

In this section a new approximation $\left\{u_{h}^{*}, p_{h}^{*}\right\}$ to $\{u, p\}$ in $V \times W$ will be introduced and then used to establish superconvergent error estimates. As in Bramble-Schatz [2,3], $\left\{u_{h}^{*}, p_{h}^{*}\right\}$ is obtained by considering certain «averages» of $\left\{u_{h}, p_{h}\right\}$ that are formed by the convolution of $\left\{u_{h}, p_{h}\right\}$ with a kernel $K_{h}$, defined as follows.

For $t$ real, let

$$
\chi(t)= \begin{cases}1, & |t| \leqslant 1 / 2 \\ 0, & |t|>1 / 2\end{cases}
$$

and, for $l$ an integer, set

$$
\psi_{1}^{(l)}(t)=\chi * \chi * \cdots * \chi,
$$

convolution $l-1$ times. The function $\psi_{1}^{(l)}$ is the one-dimensional $B$-spline basis function of order $l$.
Next, let $c_{i}, 0 \leqslant i \leqslant k$, be determined as the unique solution of the linear system of algebraic equations

$$
\sum_{i=0}^{k} c_{i} \int_{\mathbb{R}} \psi_{1}^{(k+2)}(y)(y+i)^{2 m} d y=\delta_{0 m}, \quad 0 \leqslant m \leqslant k
$$

For $x \in \mathbb{R}^{2}$, define $K_{h}$ by

$$
K_{h}(x)=K_{h, k+2}^{2 k+2}(x)=\prod_{m=1}^{2}\left(\sum_{i=-k}^{k} h^{-1} c_{i}^{\prime} \psi_{1}^{(k+2)}\left(h^{-1} x_{m}^{-i}\right)\right),
$$

where the constants $c_{j}^{\prime}$ are given by

\begin{aligned}
c_{0}^{\prime} & =c_{0} \\
c_{-i}^{\prime} & =c_{i}^{\prime}=c_{i} / 2, \quad 1 \leqslant i \leqslant k .
\end{aligned}
$$

It is known [2, 3] that
(6.1) $\left\|K_{h} * w-w\right\| \leqslant Q\|w\|_{r} h^{r}, \quad$ if $\quad w \in H^{r}(\Omega), 0 \leqslant r \leqslant 2 k+2$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|D^{v}\left(K_{h} * w\right)\right\|_{s} \leqslant Q\left\|\partial^{v} w\right\|_{s}, \quad \text { if } \quad w \in H^{s}(\Omega), s \in \mathbb{Z} \tag{6.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $D^{\nu}=\frac{\partial^{|\nu|}}{\partial x_{1}^{\nu_{1}} \partial x_{2}^{\nu_{2}}}$, and $\partial^{\nu}$ is the corresponding forward difference with step $h$, as defined in the previous section. Also,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\|w\| \leqslant Q \sum_{|\nu| \leqslant s}\left\|D^{v} w\right\|_{-s}, \quad 0 \leqslant s \in \mathbb{Z}, w \in L^{2}(\Omega) \tag{6.3}

The main theorem in this work can now be stated and proved.
Theorem 6.1: Let the index $k$ of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ be odd, and at least one. Assume that $d$ is constant, and that $p \in H^{r}(\Omega)$ for $2 \leqslant r \leqslant 2 k+4$. If the mixed method for the periodic problem corresponding to (1.1) is initialized by

then for $h$ sufficient small

$$
\left\|u-u_{h}^{*}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}+\left\|p-p_{h^{*}}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)} \leqslant Q h^{2 k+2} \sum_{i=0}^{J+1}\left\|\frac{\partial^{i} p}{\partial t^{i}}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{2 k+4}\right)}
$$

Proof: Recall that

& u-u_{h}=\xi-\sum_{i=1}^{J} \xi_{i}+\psi_{J} \\
& p-p_{h}=\eta-\sum_{i=1}^{J} \eta_{i}+\theta_{J}
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus, it follows from (6.1), (6.2), and (6.3) that

& +\sum_{i=1}^{J} \sum_{|\nu| \leqslant k+1}\left\|D^{\nu}\left(K_{h} * \xi_{i}\right)\right\|_{-k-1} \\
& \left.+\sum_{|\nu| \leqslant k+1}\left\|D^{v}\left(K_{h} * \psi_{J}\right)\right\|_{-k-1}\right\},
\end{aligned}
$$

and

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|u-u_{h}^{*}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)} \leqslant & K h^{2 k+2}\|u\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{2 k+2}\right)}+K_{1} \sum_{|\nu| \leqslant k+1}\left\{\left\|\partial^{\nu} \xi\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)}\right. \\
& \left.+\sum_{i=1}^{J}\left\|\partial^{\nu} \xi_{i}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{-k-2+2 i}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \psi_{J}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)}\right\} \\
& \leqslant K\left\{h^{2 k+2}\|p\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{2 k+3}\right)}+\sum_{|\nu| \leqslant k+1}\left[\left\|\partial^{\nu} \xi\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)}\right.\right. \\
& \left.\left.+\sum_{i=1}^{J}\left\|\partial^{\nu} \xi_{i}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(H^{-k-2+2 i}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \psi_{J}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(L^{2}\right)}\right]\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Similarly,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|p-p_{h}^{*}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)} \leqslant & K\left\{h^{2 k+2}\|p\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{2 k+2}\right)}+\sum_{|\nu| \leqslant k+1}\left[\left\|\partial^{\nu} \eta\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{-k-1}\right)}\right.\right. \\
& \left.\left.+\sum_{i=1}^{J}\left\|\partial^{\nu} \eta_{i}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(H^{-k-1+2 i}\right)}+\left\|\partial^{\nu} \theta_{J}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(L^{2}\right)}\right]\right\}
\end{aligned}
$$

The estimates derived in the previous section now complete the proof.
When the index $k$ of $V_{h} \times W_{h}$ is even, the same results can be proved, if $J$ now is such that $2 J=k+2$ [13].
